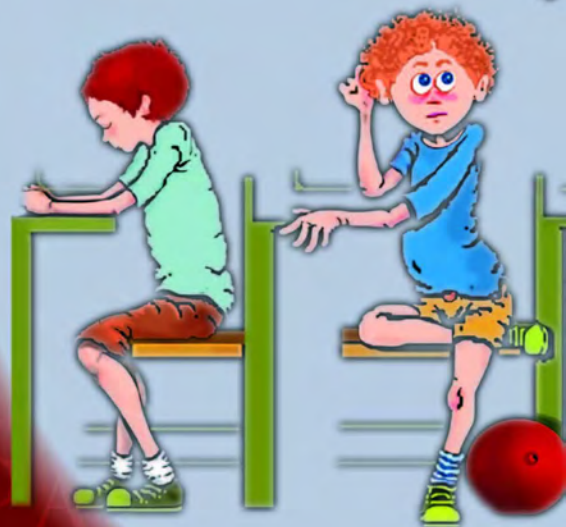

Dear friends and colleagues,

It is with great pleasure that we are inviting you to participate in AEPEA's forthcoming international conference, to be held in Athens from 3 to 5 July, 2009.

The European Association for Infant and Adolescent Psychopathology (AEPEA) was established 12 years ago, by a group of European child-psychiatrists with psychodynamic leanings, whose aim it was to ensure that psychopathology should fulfil a vital role in child psychiatry and serve as a central referent in our practice. As a theoretical and practical tool, the model of psychopathological understanding is animated, dynamic, and open to external influences, permitting our enhanced comprehension of the psyche's functioning in all its complexity and diversity.

From its inception, the AEPEA has held a number of memorable congresses in several European cities, including Venice (1996), Seville (1998), Lisbon (2000), Paris (2004) and Lugano (2007).

Aiming to provide a new impetus to our association, we resolved to organize an international meeting in Athens revolving on a main topic. For our theme we have chosen "From inhibition to hyperactivity", which addresses two clinical modalities of remarkable psychopathological richness.

The lectures shall be illustrative of leading schools of thought on psychotherapy, discussing the latest developments in each field. Interdisciplinary round tables on conceptual trends will doubtlessly enrich us with exchanges on our understanding and experience.

As our conference venue we have chosen Athens, world-famous as the cradle of classical Greek civilization. As a modern capital it is an exciting, vibrant and dynamic city.

Besides the scientific content of the conference, the organizing committee shall be offering a cultural programme, with a number of events being planned, to highlight Greece's historic heritage and contemporary culture.

We are indeed confident that the input and experience we shall be sharing at our conference, along with the cultural and social programme, will make of your stay a memory to be cherished for a very long time.

We are counting on your participation and look forward to welcoming you in Athens this summer.

THEME AND AIMS

As we know, hyperactivity has, for many years, caused much ink to be poured.

In the relevant literature that has been generated, in English mainly, it is regarded as one of the most common neuro-psychiatric disorders of childhood. Be that as it may, epidemiological studies carried out in the US and Europe indicate that there is a difference in prevalence in the two continents, mooting the question of validity of the diagnostic criteria employed, and suggesting possible mismatches in the classification systems that were used. Notwithstanding many claims that it constitutes a clear entity within the ICD, a multitude of revisions and redefinitions of the syndrome prove that this is hardly the case.

Perhaps quite rare in its authentic pathological manifestation, hyperactivity has nevertheless become a shibboleth, given that a number of disputes and controversies have surrounded it with reference to a long tradition of conflicting currents of thought in child psychiatry: organogenesis vs. psychogenesis, pedagogical management and re-education/ psychotherapy; medical vs. psychopathology or the psychoanalytical model; pharmacotherapy vs. the psychotherapeutic approach and ultimately... body vs. psyche.

The concept of hyperactivity raises questions in fact on how we define normality and pathology in child development. It raises questions too on how society deals with what it presumes to be children's disorders. It is important to state that to the degree that a given society is disturbed, the less it is prepared to tolerate its disturbed children, paradoxically giving rise to the causes of their hyperactivity.

It should also be stated that an unacknowledged pact of sorts obtains between the mass media and the general public, ensuring that the former refrain from treatments of complicated subjects that would risk our being confronted with pain, sexuality or death.

Nowadays, the leading biological tendency holds that child psychiatry is fully able to respond to ADHD issues in a manner that is purely medical and pharmaceutical, linear and simplified, offering the guarantee of success and effectiveness.

We remain convinced that, in promoting the psychopathological view, the AEPEA can make a contribution on the issue, reaffirming the value of psychopathology as a discipline capable of coming to grips with the concept, while dispelling any qualms as to the desirability of bringing multi-factorial approaches to bear on hyperactivity, given that they provide us with the wherewithal to plan treatment on several planes.

This may be seen to hold true also in respect of mental inhibition, the psychopathological intricacy of which might occasionally be seen as relating to hyperactivity.

It is for exactly such reasons that the specific topic was chosen for the conference in Athens. The topic shall give us an opportunity to discuss the various psychopathological pathways held responsible for the genesis of hyperactivity (kernel of underlying depression, attachment disorders, manic or hypo-manic defences), the complex ties that link hyperactivity to certain forms of inhibition, psychological and mental functions in hyperactive or inhibited children, indispensable elements all for opting for a differentiated therapeutic treatment, thereby helping us to avoid pharmacological responses that are one-sided and often enough turn out to be quite inadequate on their own.

(Pre-Conference: June 29-July 3, Post-conference: July 6-10)

Ports of call: Mykonos, Kusadasi (Ephessos), Patmos, Rhodes, Heraklion, Santorini

Mykonos is one of the original landing spots of the jet set, where everything dazzles: buildings, streets. Hundreds of tiny chapels dot the island and sheep graze in the shadow of white-washed windmills.

At **Kusadasi** (Ephessos) you can embark on a visit to fabled Ephesus, most complete city ever excavated. Walk down Cuteria Street, over the same time-worn stones that Alexander the Great rode in triumph, the apostles trod in hope and humility, Anthony and Cleopatra strolled hand in hand. You will see important Roman monuments and the Basilica of St. John.

At **Patmos**, you can ride a donkey to the Monastery of St John. Original gospel manuscript is also on display here. Then visit the Grotto in the Church of St. Anne where St John received God's Revelation.

At **Rhodes**, the island of the Knights of St John, you may wander through the medieval city, find your way to the Palace of the Grand Master, and visit the Acropolis of Lindos.

Heraklion, the capital of Crete, is just 3 miles away from Knossos, fabled palace of the ancient Minoan Kingdom. The archaeological museum in Heraklion, in content one of the finest in Greece, hosts many of the treasures found during the excavations.

Santorini is one of the most picturesque Greek islands, which geological convulsions long ago transformed into a spectacle of nature. A mule or donkey will be your means of transportation to one of the most breathtaking views you are ever likely to see.

Travel

Participants should make their own travel arrangements to Athens. Easy Travel, however, the conference official travel agency, will be glad to provide information on request, in connection with any travel arrangement required.

Entry formalities

It is participants' responsibility to find out what documentation is necessary for travel to Greece. They are advised to contact the Greek consular authorities. Airlines are also a source for such information.

Travel insurance

A holiday and/or travel insurance is highly recommended.

Arrival in Athens

The easiest way to reach your hotel is by taxi. Taxi queue starts from Door 4 of the Airport Arrivals Section and extend up to Door 1. Taxi fare from the airport to the hotel should be around 30 Euros (between midnight and 05.00 hrs, double rate is applied and the total cost may get as high as 40 Euros). Public bus no X95 serves the airport exclusively, connecting it with the Athens city centre. The bus departs from the airport every 20-25 minutes (a little less frequently between 01.30 and 06.30 hrs.) The bus fare is 3.20 Euros. Tickets can be bought at the special kiosks located around the bus terminal. The airport is also served by metro.

Foreign exchange and banking arrangements

Foreign currency may be exchanged and travellers' cheques cashed at the airport and in all the banks, currency exchange bureaus, and hotels where branches exist. Personal cheques will not be honoured for any type of payment; nor can cash be drawn upon presentation of personal cheques. Participants are advised to bring travellers cheques or cash. Hotels and shops will accept most credit cards.
